Treasure Valley Book Club Lunch and Share



As we mentioned in the last newsletter, the goal of the Summer Reading Program is to prevent the 'Summer Slide' – children losing reading ability over the Summer. These figures from the Children's Defense Fund are pretty startling:

- In affluent neighborhoods, there are approximately 13 books for every 1 child. In poor neighborhoods, there's 1 book for every 300 children.
- Children from poor families lose 2 or more months of reading skills each summer.
- Cumulatively, that accounts for at least half of the ninth-grade reading achievement gap between children from high- and lowincome families.

These statistics really help us understand the potential impact of the 'Summer Slide' for poor children, AND appreciate the value of the Garden City Public Library Summer Reading Program for our community. The Program puts 'books to borrow' and 'books of your own' into the hands of all our children all Summer long. We are trying to support families and children for success when school starts up again later this month. And you, wonderful donors to the Garden City Public Library Foundation, you made our Summer Reading Program possible with your generosity. We hope you feel proud of this program and proud of yourselves for donating to make this excellent program a reality.

The outreach of the Summer Reading Program through our Big Blue Bus made this Program accessible to children whether or not they could actually get to the Library. The Bus operated 32 hours each week this Summer and made regular stops at Garden City Parks, The Learning Lab



and Lolly Wyatt Headstart, Low-income housing developments, and the Boys and Girls Club.

Many days the Bus stops included a STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) activity. Stops that crossed the lunch hour were often in conjunction with the Idaho Food Bank's Summer program of Picnic in the Park – a program that helps kids who would otherwise go hungry have a healthy lunch and take home a sack lunch for dinner.
